

IFEM President's Message



It is a great pleasure for me to welcome emergency clinicians from around the world to this pre-eminent scientific meeting. The International Conference for Emergency Medicine (ICEM) is a biannual meeting that allows leading emergency physicians to listen, learn and share experiences from more than 60 countries. In addition long-term collaborations will be formed to improve emergency care internationally. The Irish Association for Emergency Medicine has worked hard to ensure that this meeting will be the most successful ICEM yet and is to be congratulated for their application and dedication to advancing emergency medicine internationally!

The scientific meeting will cover important emergency topics including trauma, paediatrics, ultrasound, toxicology, emergency administration and education. Experts from every region will present and discuss the latest advances and controversies at both a scientific and organizational/political level.

The International Federation for Emergency Medicine (IFEM) uses the ICEM to conduct its regular business meetings. Most of the meetings are open to conference participants to attend as observers. More importantly, forums will be held to discuss key issues in emergency medicine. A Paediatric Standards in emergency medicine document will be presented for discussion after a year-long development phase by an international paediatric interest group. There will also be forums on disaster planning, international EM development and other major themes.

Over the last few years there has been a particular focus on time-based targets and their impact on quality of care in the emergency department. Specifically the "4 hour rule" has generated a lot of commentary. Following debate about the best way forward in quality improvement for EM, a symposium was held in London, England in November 2011 hosted by the UK College of Emergency Medicine. A product of that meeting was a framework to measure quality in Emergency Departments, which will be further discussed at this meeting. There is a real need to reach consensus internationally on what we, as clinicians, think is quality emergency care. Quick care is not always good care!

The IFEM has been able to produce consensus publications on curricula for EM training for undergraduates and trainees in EM. At this conference we will present a consensus document on continuing professional development for emergency physicians for discussion. There is no other specialty that has been able to reach this degree of consensus at an international level. Importantly, this sets up a framework for international transferability of educational materials to support the EM training of doctors around the globe. Access to training material could be made available to countries at all levels of economic and emergency medical system development through programs such as "EnlightenMe" (a product developed by the UK CEM).

It is an exciting time in emergency medicine and this conference will represent an important milestone in EM development internationally.

I look forward to meeting many of you personally and all of you through the multitude of meetings, forums and social events in Dublin 2012.

About IFEM

The IFEM was founded in 1991 growing from the association of emergency physicians in Britain, Australia, Canada and the United States who had come together to develop a biennial conference on emergency medicine. The First International Conference on Emergency Medicine was held in London, UK in 1986 and the second in Brisbane, Australia in 1988. Then followed the first meeting of the IFEM in 1989.

In 1991 the Charter of the IFEM was signed by the Presidents of the four founding members; the American College of Emergency Physicians, the Australasian College for Emergency Medicine, the British Association of Emergency Medicine and the Canadian Association of Emergency Physicians. The mission of the IFEM is to "promote at an international level interchange, understanding and cooperation among physicians practicing emergency medicine".

As emergency medicine continued to develop across the globe, membership of the IFEM was opened to other organisations that represent emergency medicine in their country and this membership now comprises 50 organisations worldwide. IFEM represents a coordinating consortium of these organizations.

In 2000, awards were developed to recognise the contribution of individuals to global emergency medicine. The George Podgorny Lecture was established, along with the Order of the IFEM (FIFEM), followed by the Humanitarian Award in 2004.

The Assembly of IFEM is supported by an Executive, and Finance, Governance, Continuing Professional Development, Clinical Practice, Specialty Implementation and Core Curriculum & Education Committees, in addition to a number of Special Interest Groups relating to Disaster Medicine, Ultrasound, Paediatrics and Research. A new Board of 12 representatives will be elected and meet for the first time at ICEM 2012.

IFEM is committed to helping emergency medicine organisations around the world achieve recognition and development of the specialty in their own country. The work of the IFEM continues to grow as does the number of member countries, enabling a truly international perspective on the specialty of emergency medicine.

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

ICEM 2012 Plenary Speakers



Professor Peter Cameron

Professor Peter Cameron is President of the International Federation of Emergency Medicine and Head of the Critical Care Division which undertakes research in the areas of Pre-hospital, Emergency and Trauma, Transfusion, Intensive Care and Anaesthesia at Monash University. He is also Academic Director of the Emergency and Trauma Centre, The Alfred Hospital, Head of the Victorian State Trauma Registry, Associate Director of the National Trauma Research Institute and Director of the Centre of Research Excellence in Patient Safety. Throughout his career he has attracted over \$20million in competitive research funding, and his main research interests include trauma epidemiology, injury prevention and management, pre-hospital care and health services and systems research. Professor Cameron completed his medical undergraduate training at Melbourne University in 1981 and fellowship training in Emergency Medicine at Western Hospital, Melbourne 1987. An MD in Trauma Epidemiology was completed through Monash University in 1997.



Gautam G. Bodiwala, CBE, DL D.Sc. (Hon), MS, FRCS, FRCP, FCEM, FIFEM, FESEM, FRSA

The First Elected President of the International Federation for Emergency Medicine, Dr Bodiwala was the First George Podgorny Lecturer at ICEM and was awarded the Order of the Federation for his contribution to international Emergency Medicine. Nationally, he has been at the centre of the development of Emergency Medicine in the UK from the early 70's, holding important positions in EM organisations and co-founding the Faculty and College of Emergency Medicine. Locally, he served as the head of the Emergency Department in Leicester for more than 25 years. During this period, he pioneered EMS, training programmes for doctors, nurses and paramedics as well as research and training in Emergency Medicine. He was awarded Honorary Doctorates of Science from the University of Leicester and De Montfort University for his academic contributions. He was made a CBE by Queen Elizabeth II for his national contribution. The Hospital Trust Board in Leicester named the new Emergency Department at the Leicester Royal Infirmary the 'Gautam Bodiwala Emergency Department' in recognition of his distinguished services. He holds Honorary Fellowships of many Colleges and is a keen researcher. He has published more than 80 papers in peer review journals and authored chapters and forewords as well as written a book.



Professor Chris Baggoley

Professor Chris Baggoley is Chief Medical Officer for the Australian Government who provides advice and support to Ministers and the Department across the full range of health issues confronting the Australian community. He holds direct responsibility for the Department of Health and Ageing's Office of Health Protection.

Prior to his appointment Professor Baggoley was the Chief Executive of the Australian Commission on Safety and Quality in Health Care. He was a former Chief Medical Officer and Executive Director with the South Australian Department of Health. Other medical positions include Professor-Director of Emergency Medicine at the University of Adelaide and Royal Adelaide Hospital; Director of Emergency Medicine at Flinders Medical Centre in Adelaide, Censor-In-Chief and President of the Australasian College for Emergency Medicine, Chair of the Committee of Presidents of Medical Colleges; and Chair of the Board of the National Institute of Clinical Studies. In addition to his medical degrees, Professor Baggoley holds an Honours degree in Veterinary Science from Melbourne University, a degree in Social Administration, FUSA, and has been awarded the Order of the International Federation for Emergency Medicine.



Prof V. Anantharaman

Prof V. Anantharaman is Senior Consultant, Department of Emergency Medicine, Singapore General Hospital and Advisor (Education & International Medicine), Singapore Health Services. He is also the Chairman, National Resuscitation Council, Singapore, Chairman, Chapter of Emergency Physicians, Academy of Medicine, Singapore, Clinical Professor, National University of Singapore and Adjunct Professor, Duke-NUS Graduate Medical School.

He was previously Head of the Department of Emergency Medicine at the Singapore General Hospital, founder President of the Society for Emergency Medicine in Singapore and the Asian Society for Emergency Medicine and Chairman, Emergency Medicine Services Committee, Ministry of Health, Singapore.



Professor Matthew Cooke

PhD MB ChB FRCS(Ed) FCEM DipIMC

Professor Matthew Cooke is National Clinical Director for Urgent and Emergency Care at the Dept of Health in London and Professor of Emergency Medicine at Warwick Medical School and Consultant in Emergency Medicine at Heart of England NHS Foundation Trust in Birmingham. He is a also Senior Fellow in the NHS Improvement Faculty for Patient Safety and Quality Improvement and was listed the the Times "Top 100 doctors" in 2010.

His research interests and publications include organisation of emergency care services, safer systems of clinical care, clinical systems improvement and clinical trials in emergency medicine. www.warwick.ac.uk/go/mwcooke

He was integral to introducing and implementing the four hour ED length of stay in England. As National Clinical Director he has led the introduction of new urgent and emergency care indicators that balance clinical outcomes, patient experience and timeliness of care. He has also advised several overseas counties on redesign and quality in emergency care systems.



Dr. Una Geary

Lead, National Emergency Medicine Programme, IRELAND

Dr. Una Geary is the National Clinical Lead for Ireland's Emergency Medicine Programme, a national collaboration between the Irish Association for Emergency Medicine, the Postgraduate Medical Training Bodies, Nursing and other ED staff groups, the Health Service Executive and the Department of Health. The Programme has developed a national strategic plan for emergency care and is now focussed on improving the quality of patient care in Emergency Medicine in Ireland. Her role as National Clinical Lead encompasses and consolidates her interests in public health aspects of Emergency Medicine, health information, clinician leadership and mentoring, multidisciplinary team working, quality improvement and patient safety in Emergency Medicine.

She is a Consultant in Emergency Medicine at St James's Hospital, Dublin and an honorary lecturer in the School of Medicine, University of Dublin, Trinity College, her alma mater. She trained in Emergency Medicine in Ireland, Australia, the UK and the USA before becoming a Consultant in Emergency Medicine at the Royal Liverpool and Broadgreen University Hospital Trust, UK and eventually returning home to Dublin. She is a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians of Ireland, the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh (A&E) and the College of Emergency Medicine, London. She is a former Honorary Treasurer of IAEM and is a member of the Irish Committee for Emergency Medicine Training and has been involved in all levels of training and education in Emergency Medicine. She is currently undertaking training in Quality and Leadership at the Royal College of Physicians of Ireland.



Professor Arthur L Kellermann

MD, MPH, FACEP, FACP

Professor Kellermann is Vice President and Director of RAND Health at the RAND Corporation, an independent research organization dedicated to objective policy analysis. He also holds RAND's Paul O'Neill-Alcoa Chair in Policy Analysis. Prior to joining RAND in 2010, he was a professor and associate dean at the Emory School of Medicine in Atlanta. He founded Emory's Department of Emergency Medicine in 1999 and served as its first chair. He also established the Center for Injury Control at Emory's Rollins School of Public Health. A member of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academies, Art has led or served on committees examining uninsurance, health promotion, emergency care, and biodefense.



Pat Croskerry M.D., PhD

Pat Croskerry is a Professor in Emergency Medicine at Dalhousie University, Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada with a cross-appointment in the Faculty of Medical Education. In addition to his medical training, he holds a doctorate in Experimental Psychology and Fellowship in Clinical Psychology. He has worked in the area of Patient Safety for the last 15 years and has given over 400 talks on the topic at local, national and international levels, including the Great Ormond Street Hospital for Children, the Mayo Clinic, and Harvard Medical School. He established the first Canadian Symposium on Patient Safety in 2001 in Halifax, which continued annually until 2010. In 2006 he received the Ruedy award from the Association of Faculties of Medicine of Canada for innovation in medical education, and in the same year was appointed to the Board of the Canadian Patient Safety Institute.

His research is principally concerned with clinical decision-making, specifically on diagnostic error. He was a member of the organising committee of the first conference on Diagnostic Error in Phoenix, Arizona in 2008 and on the Los Angeles conference in 2009. He has published over 70 journal articles and 26 book chapters in the area of patient safety, and medical education reform. He is senior editor on a major text Patient Safety in Emergency Medicine published in 2009, and senior author of Diagnosis: Promises and Pitfalls due out in 2012.



Ian Stiell, MD, MSc, FRCPC

Dr. Ian Stiell is Professor and Chair, Department of Emergency Medicine, University of Ottawa; Distinguished Professor and University Health Research Chair, University of Ottawa; and Senior Scientist, Ottawa Hospital Research Institute. He is internationally recognized for his research in emergency medicine with a focus on the development of clinical decision rules and the conduct of clinical trials involving acutely ill and injured patients treated by prehospital services and in emergency departments. He is best known for the development of the Ottawa Ankle Rules and Canadian C-Spine Rule, and as the Principal Investigator for the landmark OPALS Studies for prehospital care. Dr Stiell is the Principal Investigator for 1of 3 Canadian sites in the Resuscitation Outcomes Consortium (ROC) which is funded by CIHR, NIH, HSFC, AHA, and National Defence Canada. Dr. Stiell is a Member of the Institute of Medicine of the U.S. National Academies of Science.



Richard M. Cantor, MD, FACEP, FAAP

Richard M. Cantor, MD, FACEP, FAAP Dr. Cantor is Director of Pediatric Emergency Services at University Hospital in Syracuse, New York, Medical Director for the Central New York Poison Control Center, and Professor of Emergency Medicine and Pediatrics at Upstate Medical University. He is nationally known for his work as a researcher and educator in the fields of pediatric emergency medicine and toxicology. He has held multiple leadership positions in the field of pediatric emergency medicine through ACEP and AAP. He has also served on the editorial and development boards of national curricula including APLS: The Pediatric Emergency Medicine Resource. He received the ACEP Outstanding Speaker of the Year Award in 1994 and the ACEP National Education Award in Emergency Medicine in 2002. In 2009, he published a textbook, Neonatal Emergencies, which has received a special commendation award from the 2010 British Medical Association Committee. He is a member of the American Board of Pediatrics and American Board of Emergency Medicine Joint Sub-board in Pediatric Emergency Medicine.



Prof. Clifton Callaway

Dr. Callaway earned his MD in 1993, and his PhD in Neurosciences in 1992, both from the University of California, San Diego. He completed a residency in Emergency Medicine at the University of Pittsburgh in 1996, was Board Certified in Emergency Medicine in 1997 (recertified in 2007), and was named a Fellow in the American College of Emergency Medicine in 1999. Dr. Callaway was appointed an Assistant Professor in Emergency Medicine in 1997. He was promoted to Associate Professor in the Tenure Stream in 2004. Dr. Callaway received a secondary appointments in the Program in Emergency Medicine for the School of Health and Rehabilitation Sciences in 2003 and in the Department of Pharmacology and Chemical Biology in 2006. In 2008, he was awarded Tenure as Associate Professor and appointed as the first holder of the Ronald D. Stewart Endowed Chair in Emergency Medicine Research. In 2009, he was appointed Vice-Chair for the Department of Emergency Medicine.

Dr. Callaway's investigative career is characterized as a translational research program devoted to the topic of resuscitation from sudden cardiac arrest. He has published over 130 peer-reviewed papers, and has participated in the development of consensus guidelines for resuscitation with the American Heart Association and the International Liaison Committee on Resuscitation.

In one line of animal and clinical research, Dr. Callaway has examined the optimal timing of electrical rescue shocks for restoring circulation when the heart is suffers ventricular fibrillation. In a second series of investigations, Dr. Callaway has explored the neurological recovery after sudden death using small animal models. In a third series of investigations, he has advanced clinical implementation of laboratory advances in resuscitation, partnering especially with the City of Pittsburgh Bureau of Emergency Medical Services (EMS). Since 2007, Dr. Callaway has created a platform for academic investigations into post-cardiac arrest care by providing a post-cardiac arrest consult service.



Dr Laurie J. Morrison

Dr. Morrison is the Robert & Dorothy Pitts Research Chair in Acute Care & Emergency Medicine, Professor and Clinician Scientist in the Division of Emergency Medicine, Department of Medicine at the University of Toronto and Li Ka Shing Knowledge Institute at St Michael's Hospital. She is the Director of Rescu, a resuscitation research program focusing on the evaluation and implementation of prehospital and transport medicine time sensitive interventions in acute emergencies (www.rescu.ca). She conducts systematic reviews and meta-analyses in topics pertaining to Acute Coronary Syndrome and Resuscitation and has established a collaborative network to conduct randomized controlled trials and outcome validation studies in prehospital resuscitation research. She is a US National Institute of Health, Canadian Institute of Health Research and Heart and Stroke Canada funded investigator within the Resuscitation Outcomes Consortium. She is a past Chair and current member of the Advanced Cardiac Life Support committee of the American Heart Association and on the Editorial Board of the 2010 guidelines in Resuscitation as the Co-Chair of the International Liaison Committee of Resuscitation Advance Life Support Taskforce in 2010. She is the current chair of the Research and Policy Planning Advisory Committee for Heart and Stroke Canada. She was born and educated in Peterborough Ontario, completed her undergraduate at Queens and her medical degree at McMaster. She completed postgraduate training in Emergency Medicine at McGill prior to completing her fellowship at U of T and returning to McMaster in 2000 to obtain a graduate degree in health research design. She has received the Canadian Medical Association award in mentorship; the May Cohen award and was recently celebrated for excellence in mentorship at U of T with the Department of Medicine Bob Hyland award.

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
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


Floorplan of the CCD


The Phoenix Park is the largest enclosed public park in Europe. The park contains Dublin Zoo,a police museum, a visitor centre, Farmleigh House, Ashtown Castle, a small 17th century tower house, monuments to public figures, the homes of both the Irish President (Áras an Uachtaráin) and the American Ambassador, as well as several lakes and herds of deer. Bordered by the Liffey to the north and Dame Street to the south, Temple Bar is Dublin's Cultural Quarter and a maze of cobbled streets. This area is home to more than 50 contemporary arts and cultural centres. There is an array of restaurants, bars, shops and hotels to suit all tastes and pockets. Meeting House Square is an open modern space in the heart of Temple Bar where markets are held at the weekends and films are screened during the summer The Ha'Penny Bridge links Temple Bar to the north side of the river. The bridge is Dublin's oldest pedestrian crossing over the River Liffey. It was erected in 1816 as the Wellington Bridge and it acquired its better known nickname from the halfpenny toll levied on all users of the bridge up to 1919.

Trinity College is the oldest university in Ireland and is situated at College Green. Founded in 1592 by Queen Elizabeth I, the College is in an enviable position in the heart of Ireland's capital. The college on its 40 acre site retains some of its ancient seclusion of cobbled squares, gardens and parks. Its great treasures include the Book of Kells, a 9th century monastic masterpiece, the Books of Durrow and Armagh and an early Irish harp. These are displayed in the Treasury and the famous Long Room which houses over 200,000 of Trinity's oldest books.

Grafton Street is Dublin's principal shopping street, running from College Green in the north to Saint Stephens Green in the south. The Molly Malone statue is located at the end of Grafton Street, opposite Trinity College. Molly Malone was a semi historical/legendary figure who was commemorated in the song Cockles and Mussels, a Dublin anthem. At the south end of Grafton Street is St. Stephens Green, Ireland's best known Victorian park.



Transport

Arriving into Dublin Airport

Dublin Airport is conveniently located approximately 10 km north of Dublin city centre, near the M50 and M1 motorways. From Dublin Airport, there is a range of transport options available. Travelling times will vary, depending on traffic, but as a general rule, you should allow at least 40 minutes for your journey into the city centre.

Bus

The Aircoach is a fast and frequent bus service into the city centre. Tickets can be purchased in advance on the Aircoach website at www.aircoach.ie or on board the coaches. The cost is currently €8 one way and €15 return. The coach pick up point is directly outside the main arrivals hall at Dublin Airport. There is an Aircoach stop right outside the official conference hotel, the Gibson Hotel. The Aircoach routes for the Gibson Hotel are: Greystones - Dublin Airport Route and the Killiney/ Dalkey - Dublin Airport Route.

Dublin Bus operates an extensive bus network in the Greater Dublin Area. Exact change is required. For more information on routes and timetables, visit www.dublinbus.ie

City Centre Parking

Park Rite and Q-Park have a number of car parks through the city centre. For further details please visit www.parkrite.ie or www.q-park.ie. The car park in the conference venue is charged at €3 per hour or €15 per day and is operated by Parkrite (correct at time of press). Please note that the conference venue is in busy area of

Dublin and street parking is limited, with much of it being charged for.

Dublin Bikes

Dublin City has joined the list of great cities to have its own "Bike Sharing" scheme, with 40 stations located around the city centre. For further details on how it works visit www.dublinbikes.ie.

Ecocabs

For short distance city centre travel, Ecocabs are available free of charge to the public every single day of the week between 10am and 7pm.

Whether you simply want to get from A to B or tour the city and take in the sights, these bicycle powered cabs offer you the option to do so in a clean and green manner. Ecocabs cannot stop at the side of the road and will only pick up passengers from 8 designated pick up points. These are the Spire Island on O' Connell St, Stephen's Green - outside the shopping centre, the bottom of Grafton St, the Dublin Tourism Office on Suffolk St, Central Bank on Dame St, Sean O'Casey Bridge, Grand Canal Sq., IFSC, Custom House Sq.

Luas

Luas is a state of the art light rail transit system that provides an attractive and unique alternative to the private car. There are two Luas lines. The Red Line connects Tallaght to The O2 and Connolly station to The Red Cow and the Green Line connects St. Stephen's Green to Sandyford or Brides Glen. The Luas is very frequent and tickets can be purchased from ticket machines at all Luas stops. Exact change is not required. There is a Luas stop directly behind the Conference venue that offers the most convenient way to access the CCD from the city centre. www.luas.ie

Taxis

Taxis from the airport to the city centre cost approximately €25-€30. There are almost 16,000 taxis in Dublin - they can be ordered, taken from street ranks or simply hailed on approach. Three of the main taxi ranks in the city centre are located on O'Connell Street, at College Green and St. Stephens Green. If the roof light on the taxi is on, the taxi is available for hire.

Tolls

Please note that some main roads around Dublin require the payment of tolls such as the M50

between junctions 6 and 7 and the Eastlink Toll Bridge. Most of these tolls are between €2 and €3 each, although the Port Tunnel toll rises to €10 each way during rush hour.

Train

The DART railway stretches the full length of Dublin Bay, from Malahide and Howth in North County Dublin to Greystones in County Wicklow. For more information, log onto: www.irishrail.ie. There is no train service from Dublin Airport.

Banks

Generally, in the Republic of Ireland the banking hours of business are Monday to Friday from 10.00 to 16.00 hours (10:30 to 16:30 on Wednesdays). In Northern Ireland, banks in main towns are open from 9.30am to 4.30pm on Monday-Friday. Elsewhere, some may close from 12.30-1.30pm. In small villages, the bank may not open every day, so get cash in bigger centres. Building society banks are open longer (and, often, on Saturday).

Banking Facilities in the CCD Area

Located on Mayor Street, both MACE and Spar retail outlets have ATM facilities, and both stores open between 07:00 and 22:00 daily

There is a Bank of Ireland branch located on Mayor Square, which opens from 08:30 to 16:00, Monday to Friday.

A little further away, within the Irish Financial Services Centre (IFSC), you will find an AIB Bank on Excise Walk, Clarion Quay, which opens from 10:00 to 16:00, Monday to Friday (10:30 on Wednesdays).

Also in the IFSC, there is a Bank of Ireland branch in La Touche House, Custom House Dock, opening from 08:30 to 16:00 Monday to Friday (closed 09:30 to 10:30 on Wednesdays). Both banks have ATM facilities but do not offer cash transactions.

On the south side of the river there are a number of convenience shops with ATM facilities, such as Centra and Spar on Pearse Street, and Fresh in Gallery Quay.

Catering

Tea/Coffee and Biscuits will be served in the Forum at each refreshment break. Lunch bags will also be available in the Forum at each lunch break throughout the conference. Catering at these breaks is included in the registration fee.

Cloakroom

Cloakroom facilities are available in the Ground Floor Foyer at the conference.

Credit Cards

Visa, MasterCard and Eurocard are accepted practically everywhere in service and retail outlets. Many outlets also accept Diners Club and American Express cards. Maestro and EDC (European Debit Card) are accepted in most places. Most credit cards can be used in ATMs, especially the Bank of Ireland and Allied Irish Bank, (AIB), ATMs, except for American Express, which can be used at Cashier machines.

Currency

The Euro is the currency in the Republic of Ireland. The Euro has 100 cents in the euro with coins in denominations of 1, 2, 5, 10, 20 & 50 cents and 1 and 2 euros. Euro notes come in denominations of 5, 10, 20, 50, 100, 200 and 500 euro.

Electricity

The electrical supply is 220 volts and 50 Hz. Socket type is a standard UK three pin type. Most shaving sockets also support 110 VAC with the 2 pin international shaving plug. Many hotel rooms provide hair dryers. You will need to change the settings on your charges or power supplies for any US machines. Most electrical items from the UK will work without any conversion necessary. Most electrical items from continental Europe work with an adapter. You will find that many higher rating hotels have inbuilt adapters in the rooms. Otherwise adapters can be purchased in most electrical and travel shops, and at most air and sea ports.

Emergency Services

The emergency services can be contacted by telephoning 999 or 112 from a mobile device. This number is accessible free of charge from any telephone and is the initial contact when requiring the Police (Garda), Ambulance, Fire Brigade or Lifeguard emergency services.

The Mater Misericordiae University Hospital (www.mater.ie) is the closest hospital to the conference venue.

Foreign exchange bureaus are available in most banks, post offices, Tourist Information Offices, airports, some shops and accommodation. Bureau de Change kiosks are also situated in many towns and most cities. If in doubt, secure enough local currency before traveling out of urban areas.

Shop Opening Times

Opening hours are normally from 09:00 to 18:00 Monday to Saturday with late night shopping on a Thursday evening until 21:00. Most shops are open on Sundays from 12:00 – 18:00. There are a number of local convenience stores that open from 8-11, some even later.

Smoking

Since 29th March 2004 smoking is banned in all enclosed places of work in Ireland. This includes banks, office blocks, public buildings, pubs, nightclubs, restaurants and cafés. The primary purpose of the prohibition is to give protection to workers and the public who are exposed to harmful environmental tobacco smoke.

Exceptions include hotel, guesthouse and B&B bedrooms and private accommodation. Most pubs and some restaurants have installed or extended existing beer-gardens or patios to cater for those who smoke.

Special Requirements

The Conference venue is wheelchair accessible. If you have any special requirements please advise the Registration Desk.

Tipping

Hotels and restaurants often add 10-15% to the bill especially for large parties. This is not mandatory in the Republic of Ireland but is normal and of course, tipping is always appreciated. Tipping in pubs is unusual except for table service.
